Choice Hotels NEC Player of the Week

Beth Swink, St. Francis (PA)

Jr., C, 6-2, Connellsville, PA / Connellsville

Swink led the Red Flash to three wins last week to remain unbeaten in the NEC with a 17-0 league mark. The junior earns her NEC-best sixth Choice Hotels NEC Player of the Week honor after averaging 26.3 points and 9.3 rebounds, while shooting 66.7 percent (32-48) from the field and 78.9 percent (15-19) from the charity stripe. Swink captured two more double-double on the season with 30 points and 10 boards versus Fairleigh Dickinson and 26 points and 11 rebounds at Wagner. The junior finished the week with 23 points, seven rebounds and three assists against Quinnipiac. The Red Flash center has led the NEC in scoring nearly the entire season and currently posts a 21.7 scoring average. She also ranks second in the league in rebounding (10.2 rpg), second in field-goal percentage (59.5%) and fourth in free-throw accuracy (80.1%).

Choice Hotels NEC Rookie of the Week Amanda Pape, Sacred Heart

Fr., G, 5-8, Stamford, CT / Trinity Catholic

Pape earns her seventh rookie award, one off the league record set by Long Island's Kim MacMillan in the 1999-00 season, after averaging 20.0 points, 6.5 rebounds, 3.5 assists, 2.5 steals and was a remarkable 22-26 from the free-throw line (84.6%) in two Pioneers wins. The freshman collected 17 points, five boards and three assists in a victory over intra-state rival Quinnipiac. In the double-overtime win at Monmouth, Pape netted a team-best 23 points, eight rebounds, four assists, four steals and a block. The Stamford, CT product has seven 20-point games this season and has reached double-figures in seven-straight. Pape leads all freshman and ranks seventh in the league in scoring (15.0 ppg), seventh in field-goal percentage (50.0%) and second in steals (2.54 spg).

Wagner College on Staten Island, NY hosts the quarterfinal and semifinal rounds of the Northeast Conference Tournament in 2004. The first two rounds of the eight team



tournament will take place on Friday and Sunday, March 5 & 7. The championship game will tip-off at the home of the highest remaining seed on Saturday, March 13 at 2:00 pm on Fox Sports-New York. It marks the second time that Wagner has hosted the NEC Women's Tournament. The first time was in 1999 when the school held all three rounds at the newly-opened Spiro Sports Center.

FLASH STREAK

With 17 wins in a row entering the NEC Tournament, St. Francis (PA) holds the second longest active winning streak in the nation. Chattanooga currently has the longest streak of 23 straight victories.

RED FLASH SEEKS EIGHTH TITLE

St. Francis (PA) has won seven of the last eight NEC Championships and has appeared in nine of the last ten title matchups. The Red Flash strung together five-consecutive crowns from 1996-2000, and are on a current two-year championship run, having claimed the league title in 2002 & 2003. St. Francis (PA) seeks an unprecedented eighth NEC Championship.

QUINNIPIAC'S KELLY IS 1000-1000 STRONG

Quinnipiac senior center **Ashlee Kelly (Pittsburgh, PA)** became only the ninth player in NEC history to grab 1,000 career boards and now has 1,053 to lead all active players in the conference. The center is also the second leading active scorer, behind FDU's Natallia Marchanka, with 1,522 career points. Kelly is one of only eight NEC stars to reach 1,000 and 1,000. The last to do so was Jinea Butler of Long Island in 1997.

FDU'S MARCHANKA CLIMB UP THE SCORING CHART

Fairleigh Dickinson senior guard **Natallia Marchanka (Rechitsa, Belarus)** became the newest member of the NEC's 1,600-point club on Feb. 21 versus LIU. Marchanka is the league's fourth-leading scorer at 16.6 ppg after leading the league last season at 18.3 ppg. Marchanka now has 1,652 career points, which ranks eighth all-time. Red Flash alum Jess Zinobile is the reigning individual scorer with 2,338 career points - the only player to break the 2,000-point barrier in league history.

Wagner sophomore three-point specialist **Joy Gallagher (Hazelton, PA)** is currently leading the NEC and the entire nation with 98 three-pointers made this season. Mount's **Myriam Baccouche (Fairfax, VA)** is second in the league with 79. Former LIU standout Kim MacMillan drilled a record 108 in 2001 and 103 in 2000, which rank as the conference's two best seasons all-time.

ST. FRANCIS (PA) AMONG THE UNBEATEN

At 18-0, the St. Francis Red Flash looks to be unstoppable as the NEC Tournament approaches. St. Francis has won 22-straight NEC games and became the first team to finish the season unbeaten since Mount St. Mary's swept the NEC with an 18-0 record in 1993-94. In 1986-87 and 1987-88, the first two seasons in NEC women's basketball history, Monmouth ended the regular season 16-0.

MONMOUTH-MOUNT 204-POINT THRILLER

On January 31, in one of the more memorable games in NEC history, Mount St. Mary's and Monmouth played three overtime periods with the Hawks eventually capturing a 104-100 win at Emmitsburg, MD. MU's **Niamh Dwyer** (**Thurles**, **Ireland**) scored a go-ahead basket with 38 seconds left in the third overtime to lift the Hawks over the Mountaineers. The 204 points scored is one point shy of the NEC record for combined points in a game. On February 23, 2002, Robert Morris topped Fairleigh Dickinson, 106-99. However, it became the first time in NEC women's history where both teams scored more than 100 points in the same game.

HOME COURT ADVANTAGE

This season Sacred Heart (14-0) was unbeaten on its home floor, including 9-0 in league play. The Pioneers have won 18-straight regular-season home games dating back to last year. SHU's last loss at the Pitt Center in the regular season came to St. Francis (PA) on Feb. 1, 2003 (*The Pioneers dropped an NEC Tournament game to Long Island at the Pitt Center on March 8, 2003 as the tournament's host*). St. Francis (PA) has not lost an **NEC** home game since LIU topped St. Francis (PA) on Feb. 9, 2001 - a streak of 22-straight games.

DOUBLE-DOUBLES

Quinnipiac's **Ashlee Kelly** and St. Francis (PA) junior **Beth Swink**, argueably the two most dominate players in the NEC, rank 1-2 in total double-doubles on the season. Kelly leagues the pack with 20, while Swink has 14. Kelly led the NEC in double-double last season with 19. Swink was fifth with nine.

THE 20-20 CLUB

It's an major accomplishment when a player in any league or level collects a double-double in a game. It's even more impressive when the double-double consists of at least 20 points and 20 rebounds. Two NEC players have reached the mark this season - Wagner's **Carrie Walker (Gibsonia, PA)** and St. Francis (PA)'s **Beth Swink**. Walker was the first to reach 20-20 with 26 points and 20 rebounds versus Lafayette on Dec. 3 before Swink collected 25 points and 20 boards against Niagara on Jan. 3. Interestingly, the feat had not been achieved since the 2000-01 season. The last NEC player to have a 20-20 was reigning NEC Player of the Year **Ashlee Kelly** who had 23 points and 20 rebounds as a freshman for Quinnipiac on Feb. 22, 2001.



- St. Francis (PA) earns its sixth No. 1 seed after completing the league's fourth unbeaten NEC season at 18-0.
- The Red Flash has won 21 straight NEC Tournament games. Their last loss came
 in the 1995 NEC Championship game versus Mount St. Mary's (80-61). Ironically,
 St. Francis (PA) missed the tournament in 2001, finishing 10th in the league
 standings.
- St. Francis has won seven of the last eight NEC Tournaments. Five times the Flash
 raised the trophy on its home court. The exceptions include in 2000 at Trenton,
 NJ (Sovereign Bank Arena) and 1999 at Staten Island, NY (Spiro Sports Center).
- SFU has won 25 games in a row versus NEC opponents including three wins in last season's playoff. The Flash's last loss against an NEC squad came on February 17, 2003 at UMBC.
- Beth Swink became the first St. Francis player to lead the NEC in scoring since Jess Zinoble won back-to-back crowns in 1999 and 2000. Through the regular season, Swink ranks ninth in the nation at 21.4 ppg.
- Through the regular season, St. Francis led the league with a 75.5 scoring average. Sacred Heart was a distant second at 70.1 ppg.
- Since winning its first title in 1995, a stretch of 21 tournament games, St.
 Francis' average margin of victory is 15.9 points, including only two single-digit
 wins. The closest any team has come to defeating the Flash was last season when
 Long Island fell to SFU, 59-53, in the semifinal round at Fairfield, CT.
- Former St. Francis great Jess Zinoble holds the NEC Tournament record by netting 46 points against LIU in the 2000 tournament, the only player to reach at least 40 points in a game.
- Point guard Karen Hewitt leads the NEC and ranks ninth in the nation in assists per game (6.6 apg).

- MSM has won three NEC Championships with three-straight from 1993-1995
- Mount St. Mary's Vanessa Blair is the only active head coach in the NEC to have both played and coached in the NEC Tournament - a total of nine seasons- three as a player for the Mountaineers (1989-92) and six as a coach (1998-04).
- Blair was named to the NEC's All-Century Team during the league's 20th anniversary campaign.
- Mount senior Myriam Baccouche, who ranked second in the NEC in scoring during the regular season with an 18.0 average, tied a single-game league-high with 36 points versus non-conference opponent Radford on Nov. 21. Monmouth's Jewonda Bright had 36 against Sacred Heart on Feb. 26

- Kelly is on pace to become the first NEC player to lead the league in rebounding in back-to-back seasons since Rider's Jessica Beck did it three-straight times from 1993-1996. Kelly currently ranks second in the nation in the category at 12.5 per game.
- Twice this season Kelly collected 20 more rebounds twice including a season-best 24 versus Harvard on Jan. 13 and 22 against Fairleigh Dickinson on Ian. 22.

- Fairleigh Dickinson has two NEC Tournament Champions in 1990 and 1992.
- FDU earns a No. 5 seed after missing the tournament completely in 2003. The last time the Knights had a six-game turnaround from its previous season was in 1995-96 when they compiled a 12-15 record after finishing 7-20 the previous season.
- The Knights have made it to the tournament four out of the last five seasons and have been knocked out in the first round in each of their last three appearances.
- The No. 5 seed is the highest any FDU team has reached since 1992-93 when they were No. 1.
- Senior Natallia Marchanka is the league's active leading scorer with 1,652 career points entering the tournament. Her 17.8 per game scoring average is second to only St. Francis (PA) junior Beth Swink (18.1 ppg).
- With a 10-8 record this season in NEC play, FDU earns its best record since identical marks in 2000 and 2001.
- Kanesha Wright has quietly collected 8.2 points and 5.2 rebounds per contest this season. She currently leads the Knights in field-goal percentage, hitting 90-172 attempts (52.3%).

- Sacred Heart set a school record with a 14-4 mark in NEC play this season, earning its highest seed in the NEC Tournament since joining the league in 1999.
 The Pioneers' 20-7 overall record ties a school record originally set in 1995-96 (pre-NEC). Sacred Heart has at least 11 games in conference play since joining the NEC.
- The No. 2 seed is the Pioneers biggest advantage, having swept through its home slate with a 14-0 mark at the Pitt Center. SHU's last loss at home came at last season's semifinal round, falling to LIU, 51-48, at the Pitt Center.
- Despite never finishing below tied for third place in the NEC's final standings since joining the conference, Sacred Heart's lowest seed in the NEC's came in 2000 when the Pioneers slotted in at No. 5.
- Freshman Amanda Pape led rookies with a 15.0 point average during the regular season, which ranked seventh overall in the NEC. The six-time NEC Rookie of the Week honoree, also stood eighth in the league in field-goal percentage (49.6%), 10th in free-throw percentage (72.6%), 10th in rebounding (6.2 rpg) and second in steals (2.48 spg).
- Junior Colleen Duggan guided the NEC with 1.56 blocks per contest this season, including a league-best six at Monmouth on Feb. 26.
- Nicolle Rubino, who ranked eighth in the NEC with 52 steals this season, collected a single-game NEC high of seven thefts at Monmouth on Feb. 26.
- The senior class for the Pioneers have combined to win a school-best 71 games during their four-year careers.
- Ashley Kohl, who has 54 three-pointers on the season, has hit six threes in three straight games and has also hit 24 on the Pioneers' recent five-game winning streak.

 Monmouth earns the No. 3 seed for the second-straight season and plays Wagner, again in the quarterfinals. The Hawks defeated the Seahawks, 51-48, last season in the quarterfinals, and in 2002, No. 5 Wagner dropped the No. 4 Hawks, 73-59 in the same round.

- The Hawks won their first and only conference championship in 1987, the first season of NEC women's basketball.
- Senior Jewonda Bright tied an NEC single-game high of 36 points against Sacred Heart on Feb. 26. Mount's Myriam Baccouche did the same versus Radford on Nov. 21.
- Junior guard Erin Winston collected six steals in three different games this season. She had six in one NEC game versus St. Francis (NY) on Feb. 11.
- Niamh Dwyer led the Hawks in scoring much of the season, and finished the regular season with a 14.3 scoring average, which ranked ninth in the NEC. She also hit 57 three pointers, good for fifth.
- Monmouth won at least 10 NEC games for the sixth-straight season, posting an 11-7 record.
- The Hawks have played a league-high four overtime games this season and have a 2-2 record in those contests. MU won back-to-back overtime thriller against Mount St. Mary's on Jan. 31 and versus Robert Morris on Feb. 2.

- The No. 7 seed is Long Island's lowest since 1998 (No. 8).
- The Blackbirds are the only team other than St. Francis (PA), since 1995, to win an NEC title, by capturing the crown in 2001 at the Sovereign Bank Arena.
- The Blackbirds have advanced to at least the semifinals a school-record fourstraight years after missing the tournament in 1999.
- Freshman point guard Kelli Sawyer, a two-time NEC Rookie of the Week honoree, has scored in double-figures 15 times and has dished at least five assists on 12 occasions.
- The Blackbirds have four players on the team averaging at least 31.6 minutes per game led by Erin Pinchbeck, who has played 1042 of a possible 1090 minutes. She has been substituted for only 13 times this season.
- The Blackbirds this season are 8-4 in games decided by six points or fewer.
- Long Island has won 55 NEC games in the last five season, which is more than any five-year stretch in Blackbird basketball history.
- Long Island had four players average 10.0 or more points this season including Ravin Chase (10.9 ppg), Kelli Sawyer (10.9 ppg), Erin Pinchbeck (10.2 ppg) and Amber Wirth (10.1 ppg).
- Wirth posted a team season-high 23 points versus Central Connecticut State on Jan. 17. She drilled five three-pointers in the win.

- Wagner retains its No. 6 for the second-straight season, facing No. 3 Monmouth again in the quarterfinals - the third year in a row the teams will meet in the opening round.
- Wagner won its only NEC Tournament Championship in 1989, behind NEC Player
 of the Year Maureen Coughlin.
- The Seahawks are the only school to have played in all 18 NEC Tournament, dating back to the league's first in 1987.
- Wagner's lowest seed in the NEC Tournament was No. 7 in the 10-team field in 1994.
- Seahawk head coach Tara Gallagher owns more NEC Tournament wins (4) than any active NEC coach.
- Entering the NEC Tournament, sharpshooter Joy Gallagher, no relation to the Seahawks head coach, leads the nation with 98 three-pointers made on the season. Gallagher's total ranks third all-time in NEC annals and needs 11 more to break LIU's Kim MacMillan record of 108 set in 2001.
- On Dec. 30, 2003 versus Boston University, Joy Gallagher drilled 11 threepointers, one off the NCAA record.
- Sophomore Vanessa Wyffels is on pace to set a league record in field-goal
 percentage and currently leads the league and ranks second in the nation,
 making 66.2 percent of her field-goal attempts. St. Francis (PA)'s Beth Swink set
 the field-goal mark last season at 62.6 percent.
- Wagner became the first team in league history to have three players; Carrie Walker, Joy Gallagher and Vanessa Wyffels, earn NEC Player of the Week honors during a single season.

NEC Women's Basketball Tournament Preview

Tournament Time

The NEC Women's Basketball Tournament continues to be on campus this year, with the quarterfinals and semifinals being contested on the campus of Wagner College at the Spiro Sports Center on March 5-7. The last time Wagner hosted the women's tournament was in the newly-constructed Spiro Sports Center in 1999 as part of a combined men's and women's tournament including both championship games. This year, the NEC Championship game will be played at the highest remaining seed on Saturday, March 13, in a matchup that will be aired live on Fox Sports-NY beginning at 2:00 pm. The top eight teams qualify for the tournament. Quarterfinal games at Wagner will take place on Friday, March 5 at 12:00 pm, 2:30 pm, 5:30 pm and 8:00 pm, while the semifinals on Sunday, March 7 will tipoff at 12:00 pm and 2:30 pm.

NEC Tournament Tidbits

- Seven of eight teams from last year's tournament return in 2004. The only exception is that Fairleigh Dickinson replaces UMBC in this year's field.
- This year features three rematches from last season's quarterfinal round. In 2003, No. 1 St. Francis (PA) defeated No. 8 Mount St. Mary's, 80-63. No. 4 Long Island dropped No. 5 Sacred Heart, 51-48, while No. 3 Monmouth topped No. 6 Wagner, 51-48.
- The lowest seed to ever win an NEC Tournament was Robert Morris in 1991. The Colonials, who entered the tournament as the number 4 seed won its second of two NEC Crowns under head coach Dan Swalga. The '91 Colonials are the only team to win the tournament and finish the season with a below-500 overall record (13-17).
- St. Francis (PA) has the best tournament winning percentage (.862), most tournament wins (25) and most NEC Championships (7) of any conference team.
- Mount St. Mary's ranks second to the Red Flash in all the above mentioned categories with a .607 tournament winning percentage, 17 tournament wins and three NEC Championships. The Mount does have the most semifinal appearances with 12 showings.
- Nine of the 17 NEC Championships have been won by the top seed, while eight titles have been claimed by the #2-#4 seeds.
- St. Francis (PA) won an unprecedented five consecutive NEC Championships from the 1995-96 season through the 1999-2000 campaign. Although the Red Flash missed the NEC Tournament in 2001, they came back in top form in 2002 and 2003 to claim their sixth and seventh league crown. St. Francis (PA) heads into tournament action this year on a 21-game tournament winning streak.
- With 20-plus wins in the same season, St. Francis (PA) (22) and Sacred Heart (20) became just the third duo in NEC history to win 20 or more games in the same season. St. Francis (PA) (23) and Mount St. Mary's (20) reached the feat in 1999-00, after Mount St. Mary's (23) and Fairleigh Dickinson (23) each won 20 or more in 1991-92.
- Mount St. Mary's Vanessa Blair is the only active head coach in the NEC to have both played and coached in the NEC Tournament, a total of nine tournaments-three as a player for the Mountaineers (1989-92) and six as a coach (1998-04).
- Wagner is the only team in the conference to have played in every NEC postseason tournament since the NEC began sponsoring women's basketball in 1986-87. In 17 league playoffs, the Seahawks have advanced to the semifinals nine times, championship four times and have won the title once, in 1989.
- St. Francis (PA)'s Jess Zinobile is the only player in league history to earn Tournament Most Valuable Player honors three times. She won her first award during her rookie campaign in 1997, then was named tourney MVP again in her junior (1999) and senior (2000) seasons.
- Mary Markey of St. Francis (PA) joins Zinobile as the only other multiple NEC Tournament MVP honoree, garnering the award in both 1996 and 1998.
- St. Francis (PA)'s Beth Swink was named NEC Tournament MVP last season, after leading the Red Flash to their seventh NEC Championship.
- Only three players have earned both Tournament MVP and Player of the Year accolades in the same season. Monmouth's Linda Wilson was honored with both awards during the league's inaugural season in 1986-87, followed by Mount St. Mary's Susie Rowlyk in 1993-94 and St. Francis (PA)'s Jess Zinobile in 1999-2000.
- Mount St. Mary's earned the league's first two automatic berths to the NCAA Tournament in 1994 and 1995.
- Sacred Heart's Ashley Kohl tied an NEC Tournament record with six three-point field goals made in the Pioneers quarterfinal win over Quinnipiac two years ago.
- Long Island won its first-ever NEC Championship in 2001, upsetting both the #1 (Mount St. Mary's) and #2 (Quinnipiac) seeds in the process.
- Since turning Division I and entering the NEC in 1999-2000, Sacred Heart has earned five consecutive postseason tournament berths.
- Including this year, QU has appeared in five of six NEC Tournaments since joining the league in 1998-99. QU had its best tournament showing in 2001, falling to eventual champion LIU in overtime during the semifinals.
- Former St. Francis (PA) head coach Jenny Przekwas, who guided the Red Flash to four-consecutive NEC Championships (1995-99), has the most tournament wins in league history with 16. Mount St. Mary's head coach Bill Sheahan (1990-98) is second with 14.

NCAA Tournament Appearances

The NEC Tournament champion has received an automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament since the 1993-94 season. Mount St. Mary's received NCAA Tournament appearances in 1994 and 1995 and then St. Francis (PA) went on a five-year string and appeared in the NCAA Tournament from 1996-2000. Long Island made its first showing in the NCAA opening round in 2001, before the Red Flash returned to NCAA Tournament play last season. The NEC has yet to win an opening round game. The highest an NEC team has been seeded is #13, which occurred in 1995 when Mount St. Mary's was seeded #13 in the East Region. The NEC has been placed in the East Region five times, Midwest Region three times and Mideast Region twice, including last season. Here's a breakdown of the NEC's NCAA Tournament results.

OTHERS TO WATCH

Fairleigh Dickinson junior **Kay Odenwaelder (Goshen, CT)** and senior **Jennifer Kozlowski (Linwood, PA)** are nice complements to team leader Natallia Marchanka. Odenwaelder, not only ranks 13th in NEC in both scoring (11.6 ppg) and rebounding (5.5 rpg), she ranks first in the NEC and 17th in the nation in free-throw percentage (85.7%). Remarkably, Odenwaelder has made 90-105 free throws this season. Kozlowski, on the other hand, has the 17th best scoring average in the NEC (10.8 ppg) and is 11th in three-pointers with 40.

Long Island enters the tournament with four players averaging double-figures, amazingly by a spread of just 10.9-10.1 points per contest. Ravin Chase (Baltimore, MD / Randallstown) leads the pack at 10.9 per game followed by two-time NEC Rookie of the Week winner Kelli Sawyer (Philadelphia, PA / Friends Select) at 10.8 ppg. Erin Pinchbeck (Albany, NY / Guilderland) is at 10.2 ppg, while Amber Wirth (Hastings, MN / Hastings) is at 10.1 ppg. Chase has scored in double-figures 17 times this season after doing so only five times in the previous two years. The junior is averaging 12.1 points and 6.9 rebounds in 14 road games this season.

Monmouth senior **Jewonda Bright** (**Norfolk**, **VA / Norview**) is playing her best basketball. Over the last five games, Bright is averaging 15.2 points and 7.6 rebounds, while shooting 59.6 percent from the field and 80.0 percent from the free-throw line. In the highest scoring game of the season, Bright collected 36 points and 15 rebounds in a double-overtime thriller against Sacred Heart on Feb. 26. On the season, the senior ranks 12th in the NEC in scoring (11.9 ppg), fourth in rebounding (7.7 rpg) and fourth in field-goal percentage (56.4%).

Mount St. Mary's senior **Adrienne Harris (Richmond, VA / Largo {MD})** is one of the top guards in the NEC. The 5-4 sparkplug, is among the NEC leaders in several different statistical categories. For the season, Harris stands fifth in league in scoring (15.7 ppg), 10th in field-goal accuracy (45.6%), second in free-throw percentage (84.9%), eighth in assists (3.74 apg) and third in steals (2.44 spg). Harris has compiled 1,360 career points (7th on the NEC list) and 314 assists (4th).

Quinnipiac forward **Sara Esidore (Portland, CT / Portland)** is closing out her senior season in strong fashion. The league's eighth leading scorer at 14.5 ppg, is averaging a team-high 17 points over the last five Quinnipiac contests and is shooting 46.4 percent from the field and 44.4 percent from downtown. Esidore has scored double-figures in nine straight games including a 31-points effort against St. Francis (PA) on Valentine's Day.

Sacred Heart guard **Nicolle Rubino (Port Jefferson, NY / Comsewogue)**, the 2003 NEC Rookie of the Year, has had a strong second season for the Pioneers, averaging 11.6 points per game (13th in NEC), which adds to her all-around game. Rubino has collected 52 steals and 77 assists on the season, second on the squad. She also ranks eighth in the league in three-point percentage (36.4%) and 10th in three-pointers made (43).

Point guard **Karen Hewitt (Cincinnati, OH / Cincinnati Hills)** will graduate as one of the best distributors in conference history, if not the best. With 555 assists for her four-year career, Hewitt ranks second all-time behind St. Francis (NY)'s Sandy Salerno (1987-91), who dished out 589. This season, Hewitt ranks 12th in the nation in assists per game at 6.6. Sure handed, Hewitt holds the best assist-to-turnover ratio in the NEC, handing out 2.05 assists for every one turnover. She ranked third in the category last season (1.85).

Wagner senior and 2003 first-team All-NEC member **Carrie Walker (Gibsonia, PA / Pine-Richland)**, missed 11 games this season due a thumb, and returned to action on Feb. 26 versus St. Francis (PA). If her season averages remain true, the Seahawks will be a tough six seed on its home floor. On the year, the center is averaging 16.9 points and 10.4 rebounds per contest. With Walker out of the lineup, the Seahawks were 4-7.
